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Cameroon like any other country in the world also have professional nurses and many schools for training of nurses of all categories. Nursing training in French Cameroon dates back to the advents of Dr Eugene who came to Cameroon to help fight a terrible sleeping sickness (trypanosomiasis) an epidemic which occurred in Ayos in Yaounde. Between 1920-1922, Dr Eugene Jamot started training auxiliary nurses just to help him out. No level of education was needed at that time, the only qualifications were a good heart, the spirit of initiative, enthusiasm, dynamism and faith in his mission. And his mission was to fight against trypanosomiasis. He succeeded to form teams that could move around to inspect the contaminated territories. In 1932, Jamot opened in Ayos where nurse aider was trained. Parelle to this, he created the training of certified nurses called the brevet nurses with basic requirement the first school living certificate (CEPE). In 1955 some of these nurses were registered for the French state registered exams with ordinary level certificate of education as the basic requirement (BEPC). This continued until 1970 when the first Cameroon diploma was instituted. The evolution of nursing in the Anglophone Cameroon is dated as far back 1884-1914 with the arrival of the German in Cameroon. The first category of nurses was called "Dressers" and were being trained in the African hospital Victoria which is now called Limbe under the close supervisor of the European senior officer. It was a one-year course, and they were expected to work as attendants to patients' wounds, minor ailments, trained to administer injections and sterilization of instruments before use. In 1933, it was observed that there was an increase in the demand for nurse, so the training of more personnel became imperative, leading to the creation of the Albert Nursing Home where nurses graduated with a Nigerian nurse diploma. In 1966, the state registered nurse diploma started in Bamenda with Ordinary level as entry qualification. In 1976, the brevet/midwives and nursing AID program were introduced and 4 o'levels in one sitting for science and first school living certificate for nursing aid, and 2 Advance levels for state registered nurse were the entry qualifications. Education in nursing has advanced over the years with both international and national curriculum with standardized learning programs based on training objectives
